Levels of Care

Independent living communities provide their residents with convenient access to dining, medical care, entertainment and more. Residents have a safe living environment, but with minimal assistance.

Assisted living communities are aimed at helping residents remain as self-sufficient as possible with the assurance of assistance when needed. A combination of housing, meals, personal care and support, social activities, 24-hour supervision and, in some residences, health-related services is usually provided.

Skilled nursing facilities provide residents with a high level of medical care that must be provided by trained individuals, such as registered nurses and physical, speech, and occupational therapists. These services can be necessary over the short term for rehabilitation from an illness or injury, or they may be required over the long term for patients who need care on a frequent or around-the-clock basis due to a chronic medical condition.

Memory care facilities provide a distinct form of long-term skilled nursing that specifically caters to patients with Alzheimer's disease, dementia, and other types of memory problems. Memory care units usually provide 24-hour supervised care within a separate secured wing or floor of a residential facility.

Respite care is temporary institutional care, providing relief for caregivers. It is sometimes an introduction to a community.

Types of Communities

Buy-in Senior Living Communities require residents to pay a substantial upfront admission fee, most of which is refundable to the Estate. Residents are also charged a monthly maintenance fee and fees for additional care as needed.

Rental Senior Living Communities do not have upfront admission fees. Residents pay a monthly rental fee plus additional care as needed.
